

FELL STITCH


Fell stitch is a hand sewing technique to sew lining to a hem and in applique work to sew one layer of fabric to another.

It's a quick and strong stitch easy to sew and this is what we use to neatly finish the inside seams.



First make sure the seams are steam ironed.

Pick up a tiny bit of fabric under the seam and leave a few inches of tail, this is to make a knot as shown on the following pictures.






Pull through the needle and tighten the knot.



Pick up the loose seam with the needle and pull through.



Now pick up a tiny bit of fabric at the beginning knot and a little further ahead pick up the loose seam and pull the needle through.





Continue until all the seams are attached to the fabric.

Make sure that the stitches are tiny enough and they don't show on the right side of the fabric.



The seam is finished with fell stitch on the back/wrong side of the fabric.
